
Japanese Ground Self Defense Force Visit to NVC

On January 26th, the NVC welcomed 15 officers from the Japanese Ground Self Defense Force. These officers, chosen from each branch of the JGSDF, were selected for this visit to the U.S. as developing leaders who will lead JGSDF in the future. The purpose of this trip, which included visits to Joint Base Lewis McChord (JBLM) as well as to the Department of Defense (DOD) in Washington DC, was to promote understanding of the Japan-U.S. Alliance.

LTC Hiroki Kitamura, JGSDF Laison Officer currently stationed at JBLM, arranged the visit to

NVC Foundation President's Column By Jay Deguchi



I recently saw an ad for the screening of the new film *Kint-sukuroi*.

The title and word kintsukuroi or kintsugi never seemed more appropriate.

Kintsugi or Kintsukuroi - a way to accept things not perfect and to find beauty in the flaws. To find strength and beauty in something that has been broken or challenging. Incorporating our wounds into who we are.

To me this definition so fittingly exemplifies the Issei and Nisei spirit and the philosophy that has impacted and benefitted my generation so much.

With the anniversary of the signing of Executive Order 9066 and the recent flurry of new executive orders being signed, it seems appropriate to think about

this. The stress and uneasiness that many are feeling is unimaginable, and they could now be left in a similar predicament as our ancestors. What the Issei and Nisei did serves as a great example in how to navigate difficult times.

An old Taoist fable also seems to lend a bit of perspective.

Once upon a time there was a farmer whose horse ran away. That evening, all of his neighbors visited him to commiserate, saying, "We're so sorry to hear your horse has run away. This is most unfortunate." To which the farmer simply replied, "Maybe."

The next day the horse came back bringing seven wild horses with it, and in the evening, everybody came back and said, "Oh, what luck! You now have eight horses!" The farmer again simply said, "Maybe."

The following day the man's son tried to break one of the wild horses, and while riding it, he was thrown and broke his leg. The neighbors came again and said, "Oh dear, we're so sorry to hear about your son's leg." The farmer simply responded, "Maybe."

The next day an enlistment officer came to the farm looking to draft young men into the army, and upon seeing the boy's broken leg, he left the farm allowing the boy to stay with his father. Again, all the neighbors came around and said, "How lucky you are that you can keep your son!" Again, the farmer simply said, "Maybe."

As difficult as things become, we can never know how a situation may turn out.

I cannot imagine the feeling that the Issei and Nisei had after the signing of Executive Order 9066. I believe some were able to maintain a similar mindset though. And though it's irrational to say the camps were beneficial, they were able to adapt, making the most out of what life threw at them, giving us a stronger, tighter, and more resilient community. Who knows what we would be without it?

As tough as it may be, hopefully we can embrace the uncertainty knowing that life always provides a balance. Our past has shown us the ability to find strength in what is broken and beauty in what is unpleasant.

Kintsukuroi will have two screenings, one at the University of Washington on March 28th and the second at the Nippon Kan Theater on March 29th.

Remembrance & Resistance From Tsuru for Solidarity

Remembrance means nothing without the courage to act. This is why we, as Japanese Americans in Tsuru for Solidarity, are inspired by our friends at La Resistencia, and all the immigrants and other targeted people who are standing up to efforts to scapegoat and divide our communities. This courage, more than any ceremony, is what the remembrance of Japanese American incarceration means to us.

We hope that everyone in our region can learn from the courage they demonstrate, because with so many groups being targeted now—immigrants, trans kids, BIPOC communities, medical researchers, nonprofits, and more—we all need each other more than ever.

We call on our elected leaders to speak up and stand alongside all the people in our community who are feeling under threat. By pledging to defend immigrants from the kinds of mass arrests, denial of due process, and efforts at deportation that Japanese Americans faced during World War II, and by committing to defend all of the people and organizations in our community who are feeling afraid to act, our elected leaders can help us all rediscover the courage we need to offer Resistance in this moment.

[Note: This statement was released by Tsuru for Solidarity after the Park Place Market Foundation retracted their co-sponsorship of a Day of Remembrance event scheduled to be held at the Market. The event was moved to Chiyo's Garden in the International District.]







2025 JACL National Scholarship Applications Available Now!

SAN FRANCISCO, CA. -- The Japanese American Citizens League (JACL) announced that the 2025 National Scholarship and Awards Program is now underway. The JACL annually offers approximately 30 college scholarships for students who are incoming college freshmen, undergraduates and graduates, and those specializing in law and the creative/performing arts. There are also financial aid scholarships for those demonstrating a need for financial assistance.

Scholarship Program guidelines, instructions, and applications have been posted on the JACL website, www.jacl.org, and can be accessed by clicking the "Youth" tab on the menu bar. As in previous years, the application forms for the scholarship program will be completely online.

- Freshman applications must be submitted directly by the applicant to National JACL through the online form no later than Monday, March 3, 2025, 11:59 p.m. Hawaiian Standard Time (HST).
- Applications for the non-freshman scholarship categories (undergraduate, graduate, law, creative/performing arts, and financial aid) must be submitted directly by the applicant to National JACL through the online form no later than Friday, April 4, 2025, 11:59 p.m. Hawaiian Standard Time (HST).

All those applying to the National JACL Scholarship Program must be a youth/student or individual member of the JACL; a couple/family membership held by a parent does NOT meet this requirement.

Applicants must be enrolled in school in Fall 2025 to be eligible for a scholarship.


If a student has received two National scholarship awards previously, they are no longer eligible to apply as the limit is two national awards per person.
